Dr. Tanya Luhrmann of Stanford University will present a talk on "Hearing Voices Across Cultures: From the Voice of God to Voices of Psychosis." This talk draws from numerous interviews with different types of voice hearers from all over the world, from those diagnosed with psychosis to those who seek to have auditory and quasi-auditory experiences. The discussion will explore the wide range of voice hearing phenomena.

Professor Luhrmann is one of the world's leading researchers on hearing voices across cultures. Her presentation aims to illuminate the many

facets of the common human experience of "hearing voices."

NAMI SCC's Peer Mentoring Programs April 12, 2016 General Meeting Write-Up

Cindy McCalmont, PeerPALS Advisor and Mentors on Discharge Manager, and David DeTata, PeerPALS Coordinator, along with a group of participating peers and mentors (see below) provided info about these programs.

Cindy began by presenting a key concept in the health of those with mental illness, when a famous psychiatrist was asked, "What is it that makes us human?" He replied, "Love and work." "Part of the trauma of having a mental illness," Cindy stated, "is that it can do serious damage to those cornerstones of our humanity." Although Cindy was fortunate to have the support and love of her family, her illness wreaked havoc on her work and her life, and led to feelings of failure.

NAMI SCC's Peer Mentor Programs are designed to help those in recovery to have the love and support that they need, as well as give them the opportunity for meaningful work. A number of peers & mentors gave a glowing presentation.

- 1) Ann spoke about getting a mentor, and was delighted to click so well with Pamila. They spend time with each other, giving support.
- 2) Bonnie spoke about her mentor, Patricia, and the time she herself spent in the hospital, a terrifying experience. She gave a tearful talk about what NAMI has done for her and what it meant to have a mentor.

3) Pamila suffers from depression and cultural stigma. She felt isolated and unfulfilled. She

attended a Peer-to-Peer class and met Ann.

- **4) Andras** was 26 years old when he entered El Camino Hospital, where he became aware that he suffers from bipolar disorder. He met a PeerPAL and became very hopeful.
- 5) Patricia works with Bonnie and hasn't been happier.
- 6) Phil has been ill 30 + years with mental illness and substance abuse, and has also been homeless. He has found a great variety of people and has learned that he is not alone. He thanks NAMI. Cindy explained the funding and interaction of organizations for Mentors on Discharge. Before leaving the hospital, the client is contacted if they desire a mentor: the client-mentor relationship normally lasts 4-6 months. This past year 16 mentors have been trained with a budget of \$100,000 from El Camino Health Care Fdn. David spoke about his involvement in PeerPALS. As Coordinator, he gets profile information and sets up the matches of peer and PAL. David also coordinates outings for current/past PeerPALS.

Research Study at Stanford Department of Psychiatry

Recruiting is in progress for 14-21 year olds who have bipolar disorder to participate in a PAID research study on sleep and mood patterns. (Participants who complete the study will receive up to \$215.) Sleep is commonly disrupted in adults who are diagnosed with bipolar disorder; however, there has been limited investigation of

sleep in youth. The goal of this work is to help advance new treatments for youth affected with bipolar disorder.
